

VEGETATION MANGEMENT IN 2023

An essential part of providing safe, reliable service at a reasonable cost is the establishment and maintenance of a clear power line corridor. Trees contacting power lines is a primary cause of power outages. When tree limbs grow too close to power lines they can cause damage or interrupt your service.



When put together, trees and power lines mix about as well as oil and water. Trees cannot only cause downed power lines in storms, endangering the lives of people who live, work and play nearby, but also grow into power lines. This can cause outages for members, impacting electrical distribution system reliability, and posing safety threats to linemen. One of the most effective ways Arrowhead Cooperative addresses these issues is through a proactive vegetation management program.

WHAT IS AN ELECTRIC LINE RIGHT-OF-WAY?

To understand why we do what we do, you first need to understand what it is we are talking about. A power line rightof-way is a strip of land that an electric utility uses to construct, maintain, repair or replace overhead and underground power lines. The right-of-way provides clearance from trees and other things that could interfere with line installation, maintenance, and operation.

It is Arrowhead Cooperative's policy to maintain the electric utility right-of-way 15 feet on both sides from the center of the right-of-way. There are three main reasons to maintain a right-of-way: safety, reliability and affordability of your electric power.

SAFETY

Your safety is a top priority for Arrowhead Cooperative. A tree that is growing too close to a power line creates a hazard. Danger increases when trees and power lines make contact, but the tree does not even need to be touching the line to cause deadly results. Electricity can jump, or arc, from the power line to a nearby conductor, such as a tree.

RELIABILITY

You hear thunder rumbling in the distance. A storm is coming. Do you know that your chances of receiving uninterrupted service through a storm are greatly increased if your electric cooperative maintains clear rights-of-way? Contrary to what many people believe, lightning rarely causes power outages. It's wind and ice build-up that causes trees and limbs to fall on power lines. An effective right-of-way maintenance program keeps many of the potential problems away from power lines and improves reliability for you and your neighbors down the line. A tree growing too close to your neighbors' power lines can knock out power for hundreds of others - including you.

Additionally clear right-of-ways ensure safe access to electric lines for our crews completing maintenance and outage response work.

AFFORDABILITY


An electric cooperative is a not-for-profit business, which means we provide a service and cover costs. When trees grow too close to power lines, the potential for costly repairs grow. Suddenly, minor restoration efforts could become major restoration efforts. As these costs increase, so do your electric rates. An effective right-of-way program can help with electric rates.

2023 TREE TRIMMING

As the snow melts, our vegetation management will be ramping up. Arrowhead Cooperative crews are currently working along the Highway 61 corridor east of Hovland and into the Hovland area. We are also beginning management up around the Devil Track Lake. Members will start seeing work really ramp up late April into May. This year the management zone is working from roughly County Road 6 and County Road 7 intersection West of Grand Marais going east to County Road 14, and then North around Devil Track Lake and up the Ball Club Road. 3RD ANNUAL TREE GIVEAWAY & RIGHT OF WAY EDUCATION EVENT!

We understand that many people are protective of the trees in our beautiful service territory and on their properties. Arrowhead Cooperative also appreciates trees for all their intrinsic values, but we also recognize that trees within the power line right-of-way corridors cause power outages and pose safety risks. We clear trees and vegetation from power line rights-of-way because:

- Power outages are frequently caused by trees or branches contacting overhead power lines. These outages can range from momentary blinks to a lengthy outage that impacts numerous accounts. Service quality and reliability depends on proper vegetation management.
- A tree that is in close proximity to a power line poses a lethal threat to anything that could climb it and contact an energized power line. This could be an adult, a child, or an animal. The result may be a tragic fatality. Public safety depends on utility vegetation management.
- Power lines contacting tree branches can spark fires that quickly spread out of control.



To keep you informed and show our care for the community, Arrowhead Cooperative is hosting a tree giveaway event. Information will be available on our right of way maintenance plans and our Integrated Vegetation Management program.

In addition, we'll be giving away an assortment of native, low growing trees and shrubs, including Wild Plum, Black Chokeberry, False Indigo, and Sand Cherry for planting outside of the power line right-of-way.
